Warning Placed on Some Covid Vaccines



CBS news reports that the FDA on Wednesday said it plans to add a warning to Pfizer and Moderna vaccines after a CDC advisory panel said data suggests a "likely association" between the vaccines and rare cases of heart inflammation in adolescents and young adults. Despite the warning, doctors and researchers say they still strongly recommend that all Americans 12 and older get vaccinated, noting that the heart problems are uncommon and in most cases very mild.

The CDC tracked more than 1,200 cases of myocarditis, which is inflammation of the heart muscle, and pericarditis, which is inflammation of the outer lining of the heart. More than 800 of the cases occurred after the second dose, and 65% were linked to the

Pfizer vaccine. The largest share of the cases occurred in men under the age of 24, according to the report.

Symptoms of myocarditis include chest pains, heart palpitations and shortness of breath. But despite the risks of the condition, a new CDC report estimates the vaccines could prevent 5,700 COVID-19 cases and as many as 215 hospitalizations among boys aged 12-17, noting that the benefits of vaccinating that age group "still clearly outweigh the risks."

Meanwhile, vaccine hesitancy and the Delta variant continue to drive new COVID-19 cases in the country, with some areas only having 1 in 4 residents vaccinated.

District Court Notes

Lampasas County Courthouse was the site of a 27th District Court special Setting on May 7th. Presiding over the Court was 27th District Court Judge John Gauntt. Altogether 5 cases were brought to the court with 4 cases involving men, and 1 case involving a woman. Jesse Salazar failed to appear on the charge of possession of a controlled substance/PG1/less than a gram, and prohibited substance in a correctional facility.

There were 2 cases involving possession of a controlled substance/PG1, and 1 case each for; prohibited substance in a correctional facility, evading arrest w/ vehicle or watercraft with serious bodily injury and possession of marijuana 4oz-5lbs.

All cases were rescheduled or set for jury trials.

Eviction Ban Expiring

A story by the associated press shares that with one week to go before the nationwide ban on evictions expires, the White House is acknowledging that the emergency pandemic protection will have to end at some point. The trick is devising the right sort of "off-ramp" to make the transition without massive social upheaval.

White House press secretary Jen Psaki said Wednesday that the separate bans on evictions for renters and mortgage holders were "always intended to be temporary."

Both will expire on June 30 unless extended. But Psaki would not say whether the administration was planning another extension. That decision, she said, lies with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, which imposed the bans on the rationale that allowing people to lose their housing during a pandemic was an unacceptable public health risk.

Psaki added that President Joe Biden "remains focused on ensuring that Americans who are struggling, through no fault of their own, have an off-ramp once it ends."

But even as the threat of the COVID-19 pandemic gradually recedes, there remains pressure on Biden to maintain the eviction moratorium for nonmedical reasons

Ending the assistance too abruptly, they said, would disproportionately hurt some of the same minority communities that were hit so hard by the virus itself. They also echoed many housing advocates by calling for the moratorium's protections to be made automatic, requiring no special steps from the tenant in order to gain its protections.

"The impact of the federal moratorium cannot be understated, and the need to strengthen and extend it is an urgent matter of health, racial, and economic justice," the letter said.

But landlords, who have opposed the moratorium and challenged it in court, are against any extension. They have argued the focus should be on speeding up the distribution of rental assistance.
