The Weather

School Board Runoff Election too Close to Call

votes were counted Tuesday it looked like Harvey Stinnett was ahead by just a few votes but...there is the matter of mail-in ballots that may not have been counted yet. So, the word is, that the administrators will wait until Monday to make an announcement on the final results.

District Court Notes

Lampasas County Courthouse was the site of a 27th District Court Docket Call on July 8th. Presiding over the Court was 27th District Court Judge John Gauntt. Altogether 25 cases were brought to the court with 16 cases involving men, and 9 cases involving women. There was 1 defendant that failed to appear. Shawn Lee Wood failed to appear on the charge of impersonating a public servant.

There were 11 cases involving possession of a controlled substance/PG1. There were 7 cases for less than a gram, and 4 cases for 1-4 grams. There was 1 DWI case.

There were 4 burglary cases, one for impersonating a public servant, one for bail jumping/FTA, and one for evading arrest.

In crimes involving personal harm, there were 2 cases of assault on a family member, one case of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon, one cruelty to animals cases, and one case of injury to a child/elderly/disabled person. There was one case of sexual assault.

Of the 25 cases 7 were resolved with Lila Martinez pleading guilty to possession of a controlled substance PG1, 1-4 grams and was sentenced to 5 years of probation with SAFPF as a condition of probation plus court costs. On the charge of possession of a controlled substance PG1 less than a gram, Kayla Gilkerson pled guilty and was sentenced to 4 years probation plus court costs and fines. James Shurtleff of Lampasas on the charge of possession of a controlled substance PG1, 1-4 grams, was sentenced to 5 years probation plus court costs and fines. Kaydence Deorsam was sentenced to 5 years probation plus court costs with ISF as a condition of probation for burglary of a habitation. Joshua Sanchez plead guilty to possession of a controlled substance PG1 less than a gram, and was sentenced to 12 months State Jail, Mr. Sanchez also plead guilty to cruelty to a non –livestock animal, and injury to a child/elderly/disabled person and was sentenced to 2 years TDCJ on each charge w/credit for days served.

All other cases were rescheduled or set for jury trials.

Wildfire Danger

Hot and dry conditions across the state of Texas will create high wildfire potential through the weekend. Continued triple digit temperatures and dry conditions will reduce the moisture in vegetation across the landscape, increasing the possibility for wildfire ignitions to occur this week.

Today, the fire environment will support an increased potential for large wildfires that are resistant to control to occur near Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, Waco, Austin, San Antonio, San Angelo and Abilene. Portions of East Texas may be susceptible to large wildfires for areas near Athens, Tyler, Longview, Palestine and Huntsville.

"An added complexity to the fire environment this week is the potential for thunderstorms," said Luke Kanclerz, Texas A&M Forest Service Fire Analyst. "Wildfire ignitions due to lightning will be possible because of the underlying drought and vegetation dryness. Increased wind speeds from nearby thunderstorms can cause a sudden increase in fire activity, creating safety concerns for firefighters."

State and local resources have been busy over recent weeks with wildfire response. Over the past 10 days, Texas A&M Forest Service resources have responded to 98 wildfires that burned 17,763 acres across the state. This includes 43 new wildfires from July 8-10.

Firefighters continue suppression efforts on several wildfires burning across the state, including the (cont'd on back)







(cont'd from front) Blanket Fire in Brooks County (5,900 acres, 70% contained), Spade Ranch Fire in Mitchell County (500 acres, 50% contained), Hard Castle Fire in Bosque County (540 acres, 70% contained) and Deerhead Fire in Baylor County (500 acres, 75% contained).

Texas A&M Forest Service continues to monitor the situation closely and has positioned personnel and equipment across the state for a quick and effective response to any requests for assistance.

"With persistent hot and dry conditions as well as an intensifying drought, many recent wildfires have required more time and resources to fully contain," said Wes Moorehead, Texas A&M Forest Service Fire Chief. "The job of our state and local fire fighters becomes more difficult and dangerous under these circumstances, and we need Texans to be cautious of any activity that causes sparks and may ignite a wildfire."

Uvalde Video Leaked

(Texas Tribune) On the same day that a Texas House committee investigating the Uvalde school shooting announced plans to release footage of law enforcement response to the incident, a video showing police waiting for more than an hour in the school hallway before confronting the shooter was published by the Austin American-Statesman and KVUE-TV.

The apparent leak of the video before victims' families could view it drew ire from local and state leaders.

At a Uvalde City Council meeting Tuesday night, Mayor Don McLaughlin said it was unprofessional to have leaked the video to news outlets. He said families deserved to have viewed the video first before anyone else.

State Rep. Dustin Burrows, a Lubbock Republican and the committee's chair, said earlier Tuesday that he planned to lead a private briefing for victims' families in Uvalde on Sunday morning, allowing them to see the hallway video from a Robb Elementary School surveillance camera and discuss the committee's preliminary report. Then the committee would release the video and the report to the public and answer questions from reporters, he said.

But hours after that announcement, the Statesman and KVUE published a 1-hour-and-22-minute version of the video, edited to

remove the sound of children screaming and to obscure the identity of a student who ran from the shooter in the hallway. It depicts police arriving at the scene quickly and approaching two classrooms where the gunman, an 18-year-old Uvalde resident, was shooting. The officers retreat after being fired on and do not reapproach for more than an hour, when several breach one of the classrooms and fatally shoot the gunman who killed 19 students and two teachers.

Multiple law enforcement officers from Uvalde, the state Department of Public Safety, U.S. Border Patrol and other agencies can be seen in the video. Many were heavily armed and had shields but waited more than an hour before they stormed the classroom.

Much of the details shown in the video have already been disclosed in media reports and details released by law enforcement. The Texas Tribune reviewed the footage on June 20, publishing a detailed written account based on the footage, other media reports and law enforcement records. The Tribune and the Statesman have also both published still images from security footage.

But the video itself shows in agonizing detail the waiting done outside the classroom.

Its release drew frustration from some state officials who said they wanted the families of the victims to have the opportunity to see the footage first.

From TxDOT

TxDOT is reminding all drivers to take extra care when driving around trucks because crashes between passenger vehicles and 18-wheelers and other large trucks can lead to death or serious injury.

Weighing 20 times more than an average car, "big rigs" require more time to accelerate and decelerate. For instance, an 80,000-pound, loaded 18-wheeler going 65 mph can take as much as the length of a football field to come to a complete stop, which is why motorists should avoid driving too closely or swerving in front of a large truck.

Large trucks have more and larger blind spots than passenger vehicles do. Drivers should avoid these blind spots, which are located around the front, back and sides of trucks. If a motorist can't see the truck driver in the truck's side mirror, that truck driver also can't see them or their vehicle.

To help keep everyone safe on the road, TxDOT asks motorists to give trucks plenty of room and observe the following safety tips when driving around large trucks:

- · Stay away from a truck's "No Zones," or blind spot areas in which crashes are more likely to occur. No Zones include areas along each side of the truck, the space up to 20 feet in front of the cab and the area up to 200 feet behind the trailer.
- \cdot Don't tailgate. Maintain a safe following distance. Be sure you can see the driver in the truck's side mirror.
- · Pass trucks safely by waiting until you can see both truck headlights in your rearview mirror before moving back into your lane. Pass a truck only when it's legal and safe.
- \cdot Never cross behind a truck that is backing up. The truck driver cannot see you, and you risk being hit.
- \cdot Don't squeeze between a truck and the curb. Trucks make wide right turns, and the driver may not see you.
