Undercover Sting Nets

Two Arrests

Investigators in Bell County arrested two men after they allegedly attempted to meet with undercover investigators posing as a juvenile under the age of 17.



Luis Adrian Cristobol-Jimenez, 26, of Pflugerville, and Paul Cuellar Jr., 25, of Temple, (left) are

both charged with online solicitation of a minor. Cristobol-Jimenez is being held on an immigration hold that would allow Immigration and Customs Enforcement to take him into custody if he posts bond.

The Bell County Sheriff's Office's operation was aimed at identifying individuals attempting to meet with minors using social media applications to engage in sexual conduct. It was conducted from August 1 to August 4, 2022.

Both men were arrested in Belton after they allegedly arrived at a designated meeting place to meet whom they believed was a minor.

Water Crisis in South Texas

Northern Mexico's water crisis is spilling into Texas, drying out the two binational reservoirs of the Rio Grande, on which millions of people and a billion dollars in agriculture rely.

One reservoir, Lake Falcon, is just 9% full. Nearby communities are scrambling to extend water intakes and install auxiliary pumps to capture its final dregs. The other reservoir, Amistad, is less than one-third full.

"It's reached its historic low," said Maria-Elena Giner, commissioner of the International Boundary and Water Commission, which manages the touchy business of water sharing with Mexico on the Rio Grande. "This is a historic moment in terms of what our agency is facing in challenges."

In far South Texas, the two most populous counties issued disaster declarations last week, while others struggle to keep up with the unfolding crisis. If big rains don't come, current supplies will run dry in March 2023 for some 3 million people who live along both sides of the river in its middle and lower reaches. "That's it, it's game over at that point," said Martin Castro, watershed science (*cont'd on back*)

(cont'd from front) director at the Rio Grande International Study Center in Laredo. "And that's six months away. It's not looking good."

Mexico owes a third of the water that falls in those mountains to Texas under a 1944 treaty, which outlined how the two countries would share the waters of the Rio Grande and the Colorado River. But for almost two years, Mexico hasn't been able to supply that amount.

Since then, drought has only deepened. Mexico's third largest city, Monterrey, about 100 miles from the Texas border, has been rationing water all summer. People in the Rio Grande Valley have no reason to believe they'll be getting water from Northern Mexico soon.

"We're praying for a hurricane," said Jim Darling, former mayor of McAllen, and head of the Region M Water Planning Group, which covers the Rio Grande Valley in Texas. The region doesn't have many other options. Emergency plans call for drinking water to be trucked in. Other plans to run pipelines to distant aquifers are years from realization. In the past, big rains have always saved the day when water scarcity approached. But the dry bouts have hit harder and more frequently since the mid-1990s. The Rio Grande reservoirs hit dangerously low levels in 1999 and 2013, but never as low as they are today.

"To actually wish for a hurricane is pretty odd," said Sonia Lambert, manager of Cameron County Irrigation District No. 2, which provides water to farmers in the valley. "But at this point that's what's going to save us. It is a very scary situation."

This disaster didn't sneak up on anyone. More than a century of development along the Rio Grande's banks have changed it from a wild torrent to a tamed channel in a ditch. The old Great River has been gone for a long time. This summer, it stopped flowing entirely through more than 100 miles of its most rugged reaches where it had never been known to dry up before.

Yet, solutions have evaded authorities in the border zone, due to the challenges of binational management and the region's historic marginalization as a largely Spanish-speaking periphery of the United States.

Now, solutions are desperately essential.

"The bucket is almost empty," said Castro in Laredo. "We are headed towards a point of no return."

Gas Prices Continue to Drop

While gas prices remain elevated compared to a year ago, most of us are paying at least \$1 less per gallon than we did a few months ago.

As of Monday, the average gallon of gas was \$3.96 a gallon, which is down from a June 14 peak of \$5.02. As the U.S. maintains two straight months of falling gas prices, many motorists question how low gas prices will go?

U.S. Energy Secretary Jennifer Granholm expects gas prices to drop to an average of \$3.78 a gallon in the fourth quarter of 2022. She cautioned that the projection assumes no additional disruptions to the oil supply.

"It can be impacted by what's happening globally," she said on CNN's "State of the Union" on Sunday. "The president has done more than any president in history to make sure that the price insofar as he's got control continues to decline, and it has included asking for increased production both domestically and overseas."

Experts say both supply and demand impact gas prices. While the Biden administration pointed toward increasing supply for the price drop, AAA said decreased demand has driven the cost at the pump downward.

"Falling pump prices may eventually lead to more drivers hitting the road again," said Andrew Gross, AAA spokesperson. "But that hasn't happened yet. Instead, many drivers are waiting for prices to fall further before reverting to their typical driving habits."

AAA said that oil prices have fallen, which has helped contribute to lower gas prices in recent weeks.
