State Revenue Increased

Texas Comptroller Glenn Hegar today released totals for fiscal 2022 state revenues, in addition to announcing monthly state revenues for August.

General Revenue-related revenue for fiscal 2022 totaled \$76.47 billion, up 26.4 percent from fiscal 2021. All Funds revenue was \$183.34 billion, up 7.5 percent from fiscal 2021. All Funds tax collections were \$77.21 billion, up 25.6 percent from fiscal 2021. Sales tax revenue was \$42.97 billion, up 19.3 percent from fiscal 2021. Motor vehicle sales and rental tax revenue was \$6.45 billion, up 12.5 percent from fiscal 2021. Franchise tax revenue was \$5.67 billion, up 25.2 percent from fiscal 2021. Oil production tax revenue was \$6.36 billion, up 84.4 percent from fiscal 2021. Natural gas production tax revenue was \$4.47 billion, up 185 percent from fiscal 2021.

"Revenues continue to outpace even our most recent forecast as All Funds tax collections closed the fiscal year \$841 million above the projection in our Certification Revenue Estimate." Hegar said. "To put it into perspective, only five times since 1988 has the rate of growth in Texas' All Funds tax collections exceeded the prior fiscal year by double digits — and those increases ranged from 10 to 13 percent. This year's rate of growth was almost double the previous high in that time. (cont'd)

(cont'd from front) Over the last many months, economic growth and inflation have driven higher sales tax collections as demand remains strong and businesses and consumers continue to pay elevated prices for goods."

The Economic Stabilization Fund (ESF) and State Highway Fund (SHF) both receive funding from oil and natural gas severance taxes. Within 90 days, the Comptroller's office will deposit \$3.64 billion in each of those funds, up from the \$1.46 billion deposited in each fund in November 2021.

Hegar also said state sales tax revenue totaled \$3.77 billion in August, 13 percent more than in August 2021. The majority of August sales tax revenue is based on sales made in July and remitted to the agency in August.

National Preparedness Month

September is recognized as National Preparedness Month, a time for Texans to take stock, replenish and review their emergency plans in case of a manufactured or natural disaster. Recent reports of flash flooding occurring in cities across Texas after weeks of dry conditions reinforces how sudden a natural disaster can occur and the importance of having a plan. BBB serving the Heart of Texas encourages Texas residents to take disaster preparation seriously and, following the devastation of February 2021's winter storm, recommends including winter storm preparation in their standard emergency plan.

First established in 2004 by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA), National Preparedness Month encourages everyone to prepare for all emergencies. Numerous natural disasters frequently occur within Texas, including flooding, wildfires, tornados, hurricanes, hailstorms and drought.

To properly prepare for a wide range of possible scenarios, the Texas Department of State Health Services recommends Texas residents follow a three-step approach when developing an emergency plan for a natural disaster or unintentional incident:

Be Informed

Take the time to consider the types of disasters you may face based on your geographic location or other nearby risks of an unpredictable incident occurring.

Review the recommended steps to prepare for natural disasters such as hurricanes, floods, wildfires, tornadoes, winter storms or extreme heat on TexasReady.gov.

Make a Plan

Sit down with your household and think through different emergency or disaster situations and what would be the best response. Consider possible scenarios, such as a loss of cellphone connectivity, the age and level of understanding of your children, possible shelters in case your home is destroyed or a meeting area in case you are separated.

An emergency plan includes immediate actions and expected actions during the preparation for a disaster and dealing with the stress, emotions, and mental health in the aftermath.

Build a Kit

No matter the type of disaster, there are a few items that you will need to have in your emergency kits, such as food, water and essential supplies for your family and pets. Depending on whether local authorities recommend sheltering in place or evacuating, you may want to create a smaller kit of basic supplies in a backpack that you can carry with you if roads are shut down and traveling by foot is the only way to reach an evacuation zone.
